Each year on World Refugee Day people around the globe acknowledge the particular experiences of refugee communities. Several diverse communities of resettled people now call Richmond, Virginia, home - and we believe in welcoming them through various programming that helps them establish roots, build community, and become self-sufficient. With our mission in mind, we host an annual World Refugee Day Resource Fair full of food, fun, entertainment, and community resources for refugees and immigrants in Richmond. In 2018, 659 refugees and immigrants, 140 volunteers, and 41 vendors gathered together at the resource

EDUCATION / EMPLOYMENT



Help refugees learn to take public transit or study for the Learner's Permit test in order to independently attend ESL classes, get to appointments, and go to work.

Help refugees learn and practice English, usually as a supplement to their current ESL or GED classes.

Help us bridge language and cultural barriers by volunteering resources, meeting spaces, and materials for refugee support.



The 2017 numbers:

- 322 total refugees served
- 207 refugees at outreach events
 - 132 refugees in driving class
 - 134 volunteers trained
