CULTIVATING BELONGING WITH SCHOOL LIBRARIANS

For the last two summers, the Virginia Center for Inclusive Communities has facilitated multi-day, residential institutes for school librarians and library assistants. These institutes focused on the theme of "Cultivating Belonging in Schools."

Program sessions addressed topics including inclusive relationship building with students, identity development, trauma-aware practices, and strategies to foster and measure belonging. Participants had the opportunity to assess their current practices in a

supportive environment and consider practical approaches that they can implement throughout the school year.

After the retreat, one participant shared, "Best experience in my 18 years in education! I learned so much about myself as well as all the knowledge I gained about the topics." Another added, "This was fantastic. I'm so much more aware of belonging and being even more sensitive to my students."





PROMOTING CONSTRUCTIVE AND INCLUSIVE DIALOGUE



Constructive and inclusive dialogue has been a cornerstone of the Virginia Center for Inclusive Communities' work dating back to our founding in 1935. Over eight decades later, the need for constructive and inclusive dialogue remains. In 2023, VCIC released a free "Guide to Constructive and Inclusive Dialogue," featuring frameworks and tools to help individuals and institutions promote dialogue. VCIC also developed two workshops to accompany the Guide.

Feedback was overwhelmingly positive to both the Guide and workshops. Based on the great responses and interest, VCIC selected Constructive and Inclusive Dialogue as the theme for the 2024 Diversity Dialogue Day forums for high school students and the 2024 Workplace Inclusion Network series for businesses and nonprofit organizations.
